From the DS

While I am writing this article my family and I are frantically filling boxes and preparing for our move to Lawrence. You never get use to moving. BALDWIN CITY—The Kansas East Conference adopted a new apportionment formula based on local church income instead of expenses. The new formula asks churches to tithe 10 percent of their weekly offering to the conference to support shared ministries beginning in 2010.

Rev. Dr. Felix Burrows Sr., pastor at First United Methodist Church in Ottawa and president of the Council on Finance and Administration, said the shift brings the apportionment formula in line with biblical principles of offering the first fruits to God.

In other annual conferences where this approach has been tried, even churches that have not paid apportionments under old formulas have moved toward giving a tithe to the conference, he said.

The tithe will be calculated on the church's Statistical Table III portion of the annual church report, said Russ Hinshaw, conference treasurer.

"The tithe will be on money received for the church's annual budget or spending plan," he said. "It does not include capital fund expenditures."

The church's normal Sunday offering is defined as pledges, money from identified givers and money from unidentified givers in the offering plate. In addition, any other money from dividends on investments, proceeds from the sale of church property, building-use fees and rentals, and fundraisers that are used for building operations, utilities, maintenance or funding ministries of the church would also be counted as part of the church's operating income.

"In-kind donations of paper for the church office would be counted, but donations of food for the church's food pantry would not," Hinshaw said. "If a portion of the building-use fees are to be transferred to the janitor or a musician, those should also be netted out"

Apportionments then will be based on the most recent statistical report. For 2010, the tithes will be based on the statistics reported at the end of 2008, he said.

Special Askings outside the budget for ministries of the conference will be calculated with the same basic concept. Special Askings total \$440,000. When divided by the 2008 operating income, the allocation level is 0.86 percent. Each church will be allocated less than 1 percent of their operating income for the Special Askings in 2010.

No limits will be placed on the amount any single church can contribute toward the budget. The tithe model will be phased in over several years because of the amount of change some churches would see in a single year if the formula was not phased in. To reach the tithe-model goal, no church will have more than a 10 percent increase or decrease in their apportionment from one year to the next.
