Scott Brewer our treasurer gave the below additional piece of information for those of you that were confused with the "choice" of giving to one or more of the apportioned ministries and not the others.

"The memo is not intended to recommend that churches stop fully supporting all of the conference and denominational ministries supported by the Mission Shares. Indeed, any church that does not fully support all seven general funds and the conference mission shares at the full 100% level will not be given credit for fully paying their Mission Shares. Nevertheless, churches are provided by the Discipline the right to remit their funds to the various funds separately, as I believe was the case all of our predecessor conferences prior to the 2014 unification. "

However, it was in college that I began in earnest to seek out God's call on my life. I began attending bible study once a week with my soon to be spouse. We attended with a group of about sixteen college students. One by one, we all seemed to find "our person", and get married. We all moved to new places as we graduated college. So began the next phase of our lives.

Within several years, we began a family. Being a young parent does not leave much quiet time for reading the bible. Once again, I would pick up a devotional book and skip around in the scriptures. Sometimes I would read Romans, Acts, or James, (some of my favorites,) and try to apply the meaning to my life.

As an older parent, and further on in my life, I started taking Disciple Bible Studies. Disciple Bibles Studies are in-depth studies of the scripture. I really enjoyed them and got many of my questions answered. This seemed to be the best way to "force" myself to be diligent, as if I did not, it was embarrassing to attend the classes without my book filled out and unable to answer any questions.

During times when no Disciple study was offered in our church, I would start again, and again, with the "Read the Bible in a Year" book that I had purchased. I would usually make it to February. About the time God was giving Moses the instructions for how the Israelites were to live, I got lost and disinterested.

So what is going through my head this year? I turned sixty. Folks have already begun coming to me for answers. Do I have them? *I'm not always sure.* I would like to have answers to the tough questions.

So I started seriously setting some time aside for reading the bible, praying and even meditation to clear my head of all the garbage, that wanders through it. I began January 1st, and have been able to find this time most days. There have only been a few when I got behind. I try to catch up as soon after that happens as possible. I am already further along than I have ever been, in my "Read the Bible in a Year" book. My appointed time to get up is now between five and six am. I find that if I wait until the end of the day, I am too tired to stick with my promise to myself. Of course, that happens best when I get to bed on time, still something tough for me. I think it has to do with when our kids were little and I treasured the time after they were tucked safely into bed, as "my time."

I have several books on studying the bible including my "Read the Bible in a Year." I got them all out. Unless you are a book nerd like me, you would think I was a book hoarder. There are a number of choices at the online bookstore Cokesbury.com. You can even download many book resources on a Kindle.

To add to my journey into the Word, I saw an interesting class on BeADisciple.com, an online Christian Education site, the end of February. I was recovering from surgery and had some time to research things out. Three weeks of rest and recovery to be exact. I signed up for a class titled "How to Study the Bible" that began March 4th, to go along with my daily devotions, bible reading, prayer and meditation.

To make matters even more interesting, there was another class on the site that interested me about teaching evangelism. I decided to take another three hours of CEU's that covered six weeks and overlapped a bit. Therefore, in the course of five weeks, I will complete five CEU's. Each CEU equals 10 hours of classwork.

The very week that my class started, along with my new teacher that was using her own seminary class assignments, complete with a syllabus and a themed paper; I had care giving issues to handle for my mom.

My mom has always said, "You make time for what is important to you."

I throw that in to say, at any age, we all have very legitimate reasons we get off track. The key is to get back on track as soon as possible. We need to get back to our routine. Most importantly, to keep learning and reading the bible ~ whatever our level. Just do it! Moreover, do not follow my example. Take the reading and study material in baby steps. It is easier to digest that way.

The class on how to study the bible was very intense. I would often have a very informational chapter of material to read every night, plus several videos to watch, and then answer questions. This took a lot more time and energy than my previous online classes. Still, I finished several weeks ago, including the paper. It has been a bit painful as I admit, my brain does not retain what I read as well as it used to. I have not written a paper in twenty years...

The class on evangelism is more interactive. However, I am writing a paper and a PowerPoint for that one as well. They both are very good at helping me mature as a disciple. I am glad I took them and look forward to taking more in the future.


God sees our struggles; I like to think he helps us with every step along the way. I want to be someone that is moving closer to God and definitely not further away. For me, the only way to do this is through daily bible reading, prayer, meditation and fellowship with believers. I see that taking these classes has limited my fellowship outside the classes a bit. Another thing to work on.

With all that is happening in the world, the UMC, and our local churches, we are truly desperate for God and his true knowledge. I pray that you *all* are with me on this; *we must be in the Word, praying, staying connected with other believers and doing our part.*

It is very easy to glide through issues we are not sure about, and hold on to our opinions. We need to back up our opinions with scripture, not taken out of context or interpreted without discernment. Most of us are beyond the spoon-fed-baby stage of Christianity, right? Troubling times call for educated disciples!

Ask me near the end of this year how I am doing. My desire is to be able to say, I did it. I completed a year of imperfect but diligent bible study this year. I feel a deeper relationship with our Lord.

Please know, I will not have all the answers. I hope to be closer. God is not finished with me by a long shot. Please keep me in your prayers! Email or write me your tips and plans or any good bible study resources. Write a book review for our newsletter or share your testimony. We need to be sharing what God is doing in our lives. I will pray for you as well. We can do this together.
