From Your District Superintendent

As we move into the fall it is time to think about Church Conferences and all of the activity that goes along with them. I am again using the Cluster Conference format, but with some changes.

I plan to hold the number of charges in a cluster to no more than three. Most will have only two. There may be an exception or two that have more charges involved, but generally, we will be smaller. I will also be moving the host sites so that we can gather in other churches and enjoy the hospitality and beauty of other settings. This smaller format allows for a greater variety of churches to act as hosts. I am planning to hold individual Church Conferences with churches that have received a new pastor this past July. This allows me to spend time with the SPRC of these churches in order to assess how the new relationships are going.

The plan is to deal with basic administrative issues at the Church Conferences. Pastors will be receiving a packet of information in early September. A reminder that the church budget is to approved by the Church Board or Council. So, it will not be necessary for the budget to be ready at the time of the conference. Of course, if the budget is ready, it may be presented at the Church Conference.

In our gathering time at Church Conferences we will worship together and celebrate the ministry of our congregations. Our theme this year will be "The Vital Congregation." I am looking forward to these times of fellowship with the churches of the Five Rivers District.

A reminder that I welcome opportunities to be with district churches at other times and in other ways. Preaching, planning retreats, fellowship activities are all possibilities. I have had several opportunities to visit churches in such ways over the past year. Such connections are very helpful for me to experience the life of a church in a different way and to gain a deeper understanding of the church, the people, and the ministries.

Ives Chapel Clothing Closet Opened August 13 in Baldwin City

Working in the school district, Cathy Gilges saw a great need for a local clothing closet and had been pondering the details for several years. She wasn't sure how lves Chapel, a small church in Baldwin City could undertake the daunting mission.

Gilges began thinking about an Ives Chapel sponsored clothing closet seriously after a breakout session at Annual Conference in June of 2010. The discussion triggering the action had been centered on community missions. She brought the idea to the Ives Ad Council in July of 2010, after Annual Conference. She also sought out help from the United Methodist Women's Evening Circle who decided to help with sponsorship. They officially began planning in February of this year. May Gorton, another Ives member, was wonderful support and help in this major endeavor.

The lves group was proactive with advertizing before the Baldwin City Wide Garage Sale in June, volunteering to be a drop off for any unsold clothes that people wanted to donate. "The response was wonderful," commented Gilges. "We have had people calling ever since to donate items." "We have been amazed at the overwhelming support of this mission." "In the future, we would like to invite other churches to come and help with set-up and take down along with the day of the giveaways."

One definite labor intensive project was setting up for the first time. "We had all seasons of clothing before our first giveaway but chose to hold back the coats, hats, gloves and heavy clothing for our October Winter Giveaway." said Gilges.

Their main focus for the first giveaway was back-to-school clothing. They mostly gave away summer and fall clothing. Socks and underwear were donated by the lves congregation. "Everyone has to have new underwear and socks for the beginning of school," Gilges reminded with a smile.

Shoes have been a big commodity. A Baldwin school social worker requested several pair, as duct tape was being used to hold the students shoes together at that time "It is very hard to think that a child is wearing shoes like that to school

every day." "That does nothing for their self esteem," commented Gilges.

They are hoping to develop a fund in the future to purchase things like this throughout the year when situations come up and there is an immediate need.

When asked about pitfalls, Gilges said she felt bad having to ask their small congregation to provide the new socks and underwear. She was not surprised however at how they came through and provided them at their Undies and Sock It Sunday's. Another situation they are working through is storage which is always a premium in churches.



Looking into the near future, Ives Chapel has plans to have clothing giveaways four times a year; Back to School, Winter, Spring and Summer. The next clothing giveaway will be October 22nd from 8 a.m. to noon. Set-up for that event will be October 19th and 20th. Anyone interested in helping can call Cathy at 785-594-2371.

Community response was absolutely amazing with 35 families coming through each Saturday.
