It presently scheduled at the Ottawa 1<sup>st</sup> United Methodist Church and all of our clergy are expected to be present for that meeting. #### Eudora UMC's New Building by Marvé Ralston

Don't let the youthful grin fool you. Rev. Michael Tomson Degreeff has had some tough issues to work through this past year with the new Eudora Church facilities. The new church sits on 38 acres that were purchased by the Kansas East Conference. It is a beautiful location on the K-10 Corridor. To get to the place they are now, required selling two beloved church buildings, using their \$500,000 cash reserves and borrowing \$750,000. They are into their third capital campaign and will have a 1.4 million dollar, 13,000 square foot building for this first phase.

With no firm date set for moving into the building, they are expecting to move in before the Christmas celebrations. This will be the finish of Phase 1. It includes six classrooms, sanctuary and fellowship hall, receptionist office, workroom, pastor's office, kitchen off the fellowship hall, narthex entry, six restrooms with several catering to the nursery and children, storage room for the tables and chairs. And plenty of room for expansion.

The building has been built with forward thinking and is very energy efficient. There were three main components of the energy efficiency. They added extra insulation, built with energy conscious orientation and it is heated by well planned in-floor heating designed by Jerry Hundley a church member. It is 95% efficient. The in-floor heating allows them to set the thermostat 3-5 degrees lower in the winter and still be comfortable with a proposed lower heating bill of 20-30 %. They should save greatly on their utilities and have dust free as well as even heating. "No cold feet in this church," said Jerry Hundley.

The air conditioning is also planned for efficient operation. The air handlers sit on a mezzanine above the sanctuary and they use chilled water for cooling. The compressors that chill the water can stage in increments of 5 horsepower (5-30). Thus using just the capacity needed, the system also lends itself quite well for expansion and future needs. Both Don Bradshaw (Project Manager) and Jerry Hundley would be more than happy to work with other congregations regarding building an energy conscious church.

Their children's classrooms are being built with licensing for current daycare regulations followed. The option is open for them in the future although not a concern now. This includes space for a washer and dryer as well. They have restrooms between classrooms for the small children as well as plenty of windows in the nursery for worried parents.

The day I visited was a Wednesday (one of the volunteer days.) There was a group of church volunteers with the oldest being 85 years old. I was told that they had all been working daily since April with the ongoing goal of "getting into their building." Volunteers this particular day were Loretta Gantenbein and Anissa Norris doing speckling in preparation for priming on Saturday, John Scott and Larry Gantenbein as well as Felix Shutt doing work in the sanctuary (see pictures.) Keep in mind that they are working in an unconditioned building in this heat. That has got to be a "God thing."

Almost at the end of my tour, Rev. Tomson-Degreeff showed me the prayer wall outside their sanctuary. Inside it, but invisible to me, is pictures and prayers written before the final drywall went up. He spoke of the generosity and sacrificial giving that has gone on in their church. They have had *Story continued after church pictures on page 5*

kitchen appliance donations, playground equipment, even an organ donation. 

Sunday, August 26<sup>th</sup> was a big day for Louisburg UMC. They moved out of their old building and symbolically moved the remaining, precious church contents in a walking trek, to their new church building. Rev. Donna Voteau with the help of Rev. Lane Bailey (associate pastor at Lenexa UMC and former pastor at Louisburg) and Rev. Evelyn Fisher (Topeka District Superintendent) officiated the service. Rev. Ronald King was on vacation but he had prepared a blessing that was read at the event by District Superintendent Fisher.

It couldn't have been a more perfect day. The sun was shining, there was a gentle breeze and it was not a typical, overly hot, summer morning. There was a full house with many people standing at the back of the former church building for the de-consecration of the old building. Rev. Voteau gave a wonderful message about some of the feelings people may now have. A shifting of responsibility as people moved forward in the new building. She talked about how this was a fresh start for them to use a mulligan (golf term meaning do-over.) The building, pulpit, baptismal were all consecrated during the meaningful service.

The children were all up front sitting on the platform steps throughout the service. They were attentively listening, and excitedly watching. This was a big day for them as well. They enjoyed the screens with pictures and song words. There was a lovely PowerPoint presentation of church members throughout the years.

A wonderful final note was the number of people who joined the church that day. Many of them were new to the community. All were welcomed and recognized. There were also three baptisms and a renewal of wedding vows. The service was followed by a catered luncheon provided by a neighboring catering business who donated all the food.

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#### Not Just Another New Appointment By Gary Gooding

A new appointment is an exciting time for both the receiving congregations and the newly appointed pastor. There is that first Sunday after July 1<sup>st</sup> that is filled with the hope and prayers that you don't fall on your face, sometimes literally.

I didn't have to worry about that at one of my new appointments, because we were greeted with some folks of our new congregation on the sidewalks in front of the Osawatomie First Church watching the news helicopter circling over the two tributaries that surround our city.

Church was canceled because an evacuation order had been issued due to rising waters with the fear the levy wouldn't hold. Luckily and with God's good graces it did, for the most part on the north, but not on the south and about 353 properties were flooded by the Pottawatomie Creek.

An emergency shelter was set up at the Trojan Grade School with over 200 people seeking refuge. That was Sunday morning.

Immediately food, clothing, bedding, personal hygiene items, and other needs started pouring in. Because the First UMC had been the food pantry point for the community, people were asked to take the food donations to that familiar spot. They did and we began filling one small room as we searched for volunteers to staff the operation. We were blessed with so many who were willing to give of their time to do this, and we were in business.

Then the food really started pouring in, from Louisburg to Plum Creek UMC's and all points in between and close to. There is no way to know how much was received because we haven't had to time to stop and count, but it has definitely been appreciated by so many.

Then on Sunday, the 22<sup>nd</sup> of July, as a truck from the Church of the Nativity in Leawood, Ks. delivered 2150 bags of love, and some groceries, that had been received in a food drive from 3 different parishes, I saw Jesus hard at work. Jesus' body was made up of people of all ages and genders, and of different faiths, all with one purpose; to feed the hungry and try to return some semblance of that abundant life Jesus came to make possible for all. I was blest to be a part of that body and I know those other 70 volunteers were equally blest, as we made a human chain to place and store food in our basement. Since then with donations we have been able to purchase a deep freeze, and we have meat to distribute also. There is still much to be done and we will be busy for months to come, but I am even more assured of God's Amazing Grace than ever before.
